

MAE LEGGAT WHO CELEBRATED HER 100TH BIRTHDAY ON 3RD JULY 2024

Mum (Annie Mary Morrison (Mae)) was born on 3 July 1924. At the age of 3 months her family emigrated to Providence, Rhode Isl and, USA due to there being insufficient work locally for her father. The depression hit the USA too and in 1929 the family returned to Peterhead with her father again in search of work. Mum attended church which was then (I brirk) the East Parish Church before moving to the existing premises as West Associate Church. During the war mum was a member of the Peterhead Girls Training Corps. and a Nursing Auxiliary prior to taking up a nursing post at Strathcathro Hospital where she attended German POW's. General POW's. Following the war she became engaged and married to Charles Watson Leggat in 1947 and they set up home in King Street, before moving to Glebefield Terrace in the 1950s and then Grange Gardens in 1965.



In 1949 mum gave birth to their first child, Carol to be followed by twins Charles and Graham in In 1949 mum gave birth to their first child, Carol to be followed by twins Charles and Graham in 1954. A fourth child, Donald (deceased) arrived in 1965 completing their family. In 1970 mum took over the local Milliner's shop, owned by Miss Fippin, in Thistle street and continued until her retirement in 2002. Mum's service to the church covered being in Sunday School, Bible Class, a Sunday School teacher, Young Wives Club and Woman's Guild. She was also a choir member as far back as I can remember until giving up sometime around 2015, I think. Hobbies included the Choral Society, Scottish Country Dancing and Bowling at St. Mary Street Bowling Club where she is an honor ary member. Mum was a profile baker, kritter and crocheter and was always either baking or making toffee or crocheting table doilies for sales of work or charities. During her 90s she was still knitting squares for blankets to be sent to Ekwendene. She will probably be best remembered for crocheting leaves to attach to poppies for the annual remembrance day

remembrance are some sadly, mum's current health is greatly affected by vascular dementia. Memories have faded but occasionally when I show her pictures a flicker of recognition can be seen in her face but no words come out to confirm this. Only 12 months ago she could tell the name of almost all of those in the 1942/43 Bible class photograph which is shown on the Guild page.

Thank you to Graham for providing us with this short account of Mae's long and full life. The above photo was taken at Christmas 2021, just before she moved to Grangepark Care Home. We in the Church are conscious of her great faith and example and are grateful for her friendship and encour agement during her long association with the Church.

Caramel Brownle Moments

Years ago I gave a sermon entitled 'Caramel Brownie Moments'. They used to have these amazingly decadent caramel and dark chocolate brownies at our local Starbucks when my older three were little. It seemed like such a treat to splurge and spend the money to have a whole brownie all to myself. Who takes the time to do that when there are children to feed and bathe, play with and clean up after? Who takes the moments to themselves when there is work to be done and a growing to do list to tick off? I preached on the need to make space in our lives for ourselves but most of all for God.



Times have changed...I now only have one little one to run after...but I do run more slowly! I have other responsibilities and tasks to carry out but the truth of that sermon is still important. I still need to make that space in my life for God and open up my ears and eyes to listen and hear from him. Sometimes sitting down with a cuppa and a fine piece might be just what is needed. But in reality, in this stage of life with older ones coming and going and the little one having clubs and such, I might entitle such a sermon, Just order a Chippie. There are times in life that it can be hard to make space for the important things, such as taking time with a spouse, playing with a child, having some alone time or most importantly sitting before God in prayer. When life gets busy something has to go and that something might just be a cooked meat. Perhaps ordering a chippie for takeaway is a good choice... though probably not for one's waist!

We all have choices to make in life but when it comes right down to it we need to ask ourselves what is most important and learn to prioritise it. When I was studying for ministry one of my professors said to us "before you say" no to something and 'yes' to something else ask yourself in 5 years what will be most important". For example, will it be more important that I slowed down to listen to God or was able to get ahead in my inoning? You fill in the blank with your own choices. I have found it an important principle to live by.

Perhaps you are facing some busy days ahead with the summer evenings ending and the autumnal weather on its way. Perhaps you have some choices to make and are not sure how to priorities what to do. Maybe you even use busyness as a way to avoid seeing others or having to sacrifice your own wants to help someone else.

Whatever season you find yourself in, whatever questions you face, the next time you find yourself with a bit of free time, you might find it useful to ask yourself these questions:

Have I prioritised spending time with God recently? (Psalm 48:10)
What is the Lord asking me to do that I have been avoiding? (Matthew 7:7)
Have I taken proper care of myself or do I need to do something different? (1 Cor 8:19) Is there some one in my life God is wanting me to serve? (Galatians 6:2) If I do this or that what will have the most impact in 5 years time? (Jeremiah 29:11)

Have fun looking up the verses above and reading what God has to say about how we care for others, our reliationship with the Lord and ourselves. Let me know what you think! I would love to hear about a caramel brownie moment or let's just order a chippie time in your life!

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

She spoke about her work with asylum seekers in Westhill, who need to be treated with compassion and dignity.
