

# MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER - REV DR JULIA PIZZUTO-POMACO

### Bask in the Son each day!

Isn't it amazing what a few days in the 'sun' can do for your outlook? Lydia and I had a chance to visit family and friends in the US over the October holidays. The sun shone every day and the temperatures were in the 20s! It certainly helped our attitude to be more positive. I was thinking that I might be disappointed when we came back to Scotland because our summer had been so grey. But it proved to be a real treat that the first few days back were quite bright and cheery. Walking the dog, encouraging Lydia to play outside and even watching the sun out of the window was a visual reminder that God's light can make a big difference in our lives.

I began to wonder about light and darkness and how the Bible speaks so much about it. Darkness is the absence of light and light represents God's glory and goodness. John 1:5 speaks of the contrast in this way: 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' Light has a way of penetrating the dark places. When we light up our dark room with a torch we can see clearly.

In Scotland many of us are deficient in Vitamin D because we don't have enough sunshine in our lives, particularly during the dark winter. I am also wondering if our lack of 'son' (yes I spelled that right!) might also impact our spiritual health. If we fail to spend time with Jesus, the son of God, do we suffer from lack of 'sonshine' as well???

Obviously if we want to grow in our faith we need to spend time with the son! Ways we do that include reading the Bible, praying and listening to the Lord and spending time with other believers. Just like we can be vitamin D deficient, we too can suffer from failing to spend time with Jesus, soaking up the light of his love and grace. When we sit in the 'sonshine', relaxing, meditating and being in God's presence, then we will find our perspective often changes. Spending time with God does not automatically take away all our woes, just like taking Vitamin D or using a sun lamp does not solve all our light deficiency. However, being in relationship with God goes a long way towards changing the darkness that easily seeps into our lives.

I am not sure about you, but I want to look at the world through God's eyes and the only way I can develop that perspective is to spend time with him. I want to be reminded of his goodness particularly when life is hard and the way to see that happen is to allow the light of Jesus' love into my dark places. I love in the winter how a warm fire or the glow of a candle or Christmas lights can brighten my mood. Maybe I am just a child at heart but there is something about these small points of light that reminds me of my heavenly father and the goodness he brings into my life.

So, during these dark months take some time to light a candle and watch how the warm glow transforms a room. Take some time to study the twinkle of stars in a dark sky or watch for the aurora borealis and see how just the pulsing light and darkness can change the sky (even if you can't see the colours with the naked eye!). Get ready for the warm lights of Christmas to remind us that Jesus is the light of the world (John 8:12).

Do not be 'son' deficient when there are so many opportunities to see God's light around us. Be a person that reflects the light to others and spend time during this dark season soaking in the light and love of God. Let me know how it goes! I am looking forward to hearing about many of your light filled God moments!



The symbols of the Christingle on the front cover: The orange represents the world. The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ. The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations. The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

She started with a school bell and a leather school bag with lots of school stuff including the fearsome tawse .Next came the doctor's bag and all the old remedies. She had us remembering kids' games and simple outdoor past times. Many items had been given to her for her memory talks. Many she had kept over the years.

However she ended with this quote 'It's not what I gather in life, it's what I scattered. She certainly scattered lots of fun and laughter for us all.

On the 21st September Raymond Mack the singing bobby came to call and delighted the group with such favourites as You are my sunshine and Bye Bye Love. With a few funny stories thrown in it was a most enjoyable afternoon.



Helen McDonald our guest speaker for the 5th October entitled her presentation 'Encounters along the Road.' Helen is a story teller . Her 1st story came from Baghdad about a caliph and his new born son. The 2nd story was local one featuring a young lass near Bennachie and is the story of the Maiden Stone at the Chapel of Garioch. From there she took us to the Jewish Community in Afghanistan. This was about a King with everything that money could buy but who was never content.

She involved everyone in her stories with some songs, actions and repetition of lines. A very different but enjoyable afternoon.

Coming closer to Remembrance Sunday our next speaker was very relevant. Michael Parkes is a representative for The Erskine Veterans Charity. The Erskine Hospital began as a converted stately mansion and was called the Princess Louise Scottish Hospital for limbless Sailors and Soldiers. It opened its doors in 1916 and very soon shortened its name to the Erskine Hospital. Built for the veterans of WW1, it became a pioneering hospital for prosthetic limbs.

Later it became a care home for veterans but is now a 5 star hotel. A brand new care home was built in 2000.

In Glasgow there is the Erskine Veterans Village which has the Erskine Reid McEwan Activity Centre after the pioneering doctor of 1916. In Edinburgh there is the Erskine Edinburgh Care Home and Army Personal Recovery Centre. They are hoping that by this Christmas a brand new Erskine Activity Centre will be opened in Forres, Moray. The Victoria hotel In Forres is being converted and will offer IT skills, art therapy, a relaxing room with counselling, indoor archery, a walking group, a gym, and a one stop shop which will be a financial advice centre.



It has helped thousands of veterans over 108 years and continues to adapt to their needs so that now they are working on supporting veterans in their own homes. 

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### Memories of Linda Reid

Linda Reid was a very special lady, who has left many special memories for so many in this Northeast corner. She was born on 28<sup>th</sup> August 1954 in Dufftown . Her family moved to Ellon area and she met John at a dance there. They married in Ellon and moved to Peterhead. Linda and John had 41 happy years together until John died in November 2016. They have 2 daughters ,Teresa and Susan. Linda worked and supported many groups but nothing was more important than her family. Teresa married Martin and gave Linda and John 2 grandsons, Kyle and Callum. Susan married Karl and gave them 3 more grandchildren, James, Rachael and William. Linda also has a Sister Irene and Brother Gordon.



I met and became friends with Linda when we were brought together by Olive McRobbie when she and Dr David Ross started the Girls Brigade in 1980. I remember when we were commissioned in the Muckle Kirk; Linda could only manage to come into the church to get commissioned and then had to leave as she was very heavily pregnant with Susan at the time. Linda has been in the Brigade for over 44 years. We have done some silly things, like dressing up as the 3 craws, a punk band, done highland dancing, and Maori sticks. Linda, Suzanne, Janis and Mildred were the Ishmaelites, (riding on camels!) when we performed Joseph and his Technicolour Dream Coat in 2001. Linda was always reliable and was very proud of all the girls that came through the Brigade. She was caring and patient with them. Linda was involved at Divisional level as well, being Badge secretary for many years. She was also involved with training and was our Deputy Commissioner for a while.

Linda was a very supportive person and would do anything to help people. She was unassuming and did lots of things behind the scenes to help in any way she could. Even when she was battling cancer that did not stop her from remaining involved with the groups that she supported. Over the years Linda has been heavily involved with the church. It started with mother and toddler; the young women's group; the guild where she was president at the Muckle Kirk, before we joined with Trinity to form the New Parish church guild where she was the speaker's secretary. In later years she became President of the Senior Ladies Fellowship (when she got to appropriate age). She also became an Elder and was Clerk to the Board of the Church. As I said at the start she was a very special lady leaving lasting legacies

At the same time as I was asked to start the first mother and toddler group Linda was asked to be a leader in the Girls' Brigade. The auction - very exciting stuff . Hard work but good fun.

The Friday night melee of the Flower Festival with everyone mucking in and who could forget the Thrift Shop in May.

The Muckle Kirk had a group of very hard working people who did their very best to keep the Kirk viable and Linda and I did our bit. We were also involved in The Young Wives group and then the Guild. She was a people person, working well as a team member and also as a team leader. Always happy to oblige and help.

We had our adventures like the time we got lost looking for Lonmay Church on a dark winter's night. We found the road but it was closed so we had to take a circuitous route by which time we had lost all sense of direction. We stopped at a property to ask for directions. The man kindly hopped into his car and led us to the church. He, having local knowledge, could ignore signs saying road closed. We joked about that for years and would wonder on any outing if we would get lost again.

We took part in a team of four in a guiz held by Guilds Together . On the way we were sure we would be a disaster as we all seemed to have problems remembering anything. But someone might remember the first name for the answer and that would jolt the memory for someone else on the team. Of course we did not win but we were delighted not to disgrace ourselves.

Latterly she became president of the Senior Ladies but sadly soon after she had health issues which coincided with Covid and meant she was unable to attend for a long time. Throughout, she did all the programming for us as well as contacting speakers for the Guild, kept in touch and was involved in all decisions. She was an inspiration in the way she handled her illness and treatment. She will be sadly missed.

# **Hopes and Dreams**

At its September meeting, the Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles agreed that the Peterhead New Parish Church be given an A grading, meaning that it is the building best suited to ministry of the Church of Scotland in the town of Peterhead.

The Kirk Session agreed in September that the building is becoming tired- looking and could be improved to make it more welcoming, more comfortable and better suited to meet the differing demands of Christian Witness to our town and its community. We need to do the following -

> Tell – Be people that tell others about Jesus. Teach -Be people that learn and teach others about Jesus Treasure -Be people that believe and work for human dignity for all Transformation - Be "salt and light" in our communities Tend - Be people that actively care for creation

Invitations went out via the weekly intimations to come along to two meetings where our hopes and dreams were recorded, discussed and fine-tuned.

More than 25 ideas were written down and discussed further.

These were then sorted into Health and Safety items which need action now -

Lower thermostats on hot water (kitchen and toilets) Finger shield edging on doors from hall to toilets Adjust sensors in toilets to child-friendly height Replace blown light bulbs in sanctuary Front door is hard to open from the outside if visiting and late

Main ideas to go forward are

Remove pews and pulpit Upgrade heating system Storage Space for Banana Boxes for Ekwendeni Glass Porch / Vestibule area to be more outward looking and welcoming Relocate organ from 'Muckle Kirk' to Peterhead New Use upstairs for storage and install lift

We will seek advice from the Presbytery Buildings Officer and others known to us who have already made improvements to their buildings. We are also looking to search out advice on sources of grants.

# **Daily Advent Readings**




